Part-time work rights for international students:

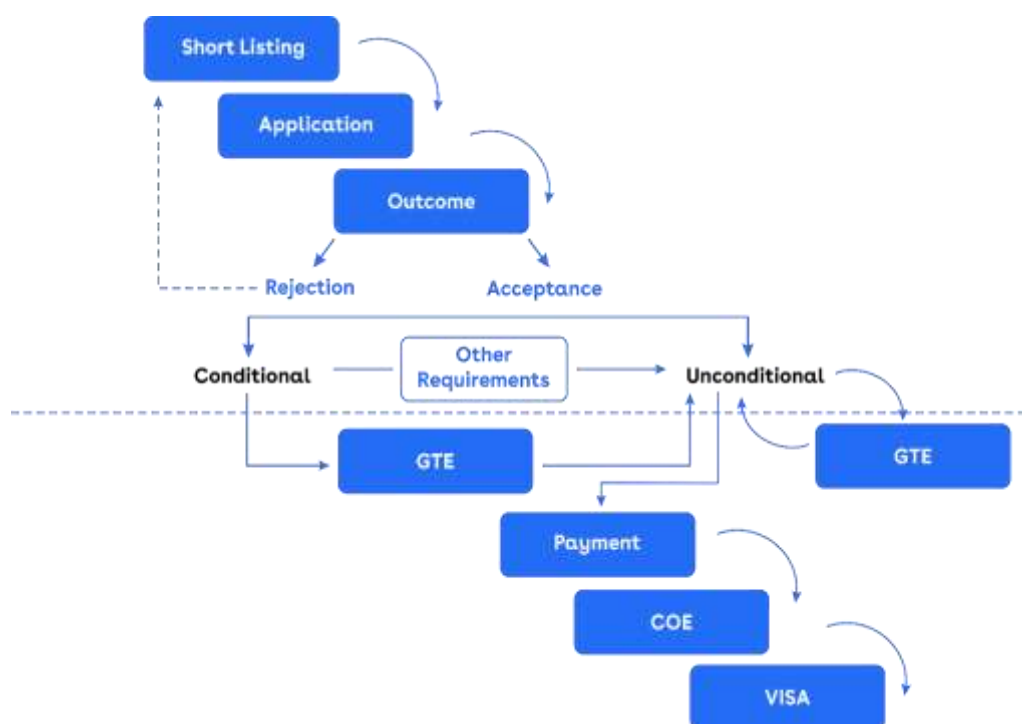
Students can work **part time 48 hours/fortnight** (duration of 2 weeks) when their **course is in session**.

Students not having exhausted 24 hours of part time work in a week can work extra in the following week in such a manner that the total duration over two weeks should not exceed 48 hours.

Students can work **full time 48 hours/week** during semester **breaks and vacations**.

Students are usually paid around A\$ 23.23/hr.

Admission procedure for Australia



Requirements:

1. Academic requirement
2. English proficiency requirement
3. **GSR**

Academic requirements:

Direct UG:

65% to 70% in grade XII

Pathways UG:

55% to 65% in grade XII

Direct PG:

Successful completion of a recognized bachelor's degree equivalent to an Australian degree

English proficiency requirements:

IELTS, PTE are accepted, below are the requirements for IELTS and PTE

| <u>IELTS</u>                   | <u>PTE</u>                   |
|--------------------------------|------------------------------|
| 6.5 with no band less than 6.0 | 58 with no band less than 50 |
| 6.0 with no band less than 6.0 | 50 with no band less than 50 |
| 6.0 with no band less than 5.5 | 50 with no band less than 42 |

Genuine Student Requirement (GSR):

The objective of 'GSR Assessment' is to filter genuine students from non-genuine ones.

**GSR Parameters:**

- ✓ Gaps
- ✓ Financials
- ✓ Marital status
- ✓ Immigration history
- ✓ Employment details
- ✓ Potential situation in Australia
- ✓ Value of the course to the future aspects of the student
- ✓ Incentives of returning to home country
- ✓ Economic situation in home country
- ✓ Relevance of the course to the student's background

GSR Assessment is conducted at three levels:

- Agent
- University/College
- Australian High Commission

**Note: Any concerns with the GSR parameters must be disclosed at the time of application**

GSR assessment by universities:

Universities employ a range of methods to assess students for GSR assessment. These methods may include interviews, Statements of Purpose (SoPs), checklists, or questionnaires.

GSR assessment by DHA:

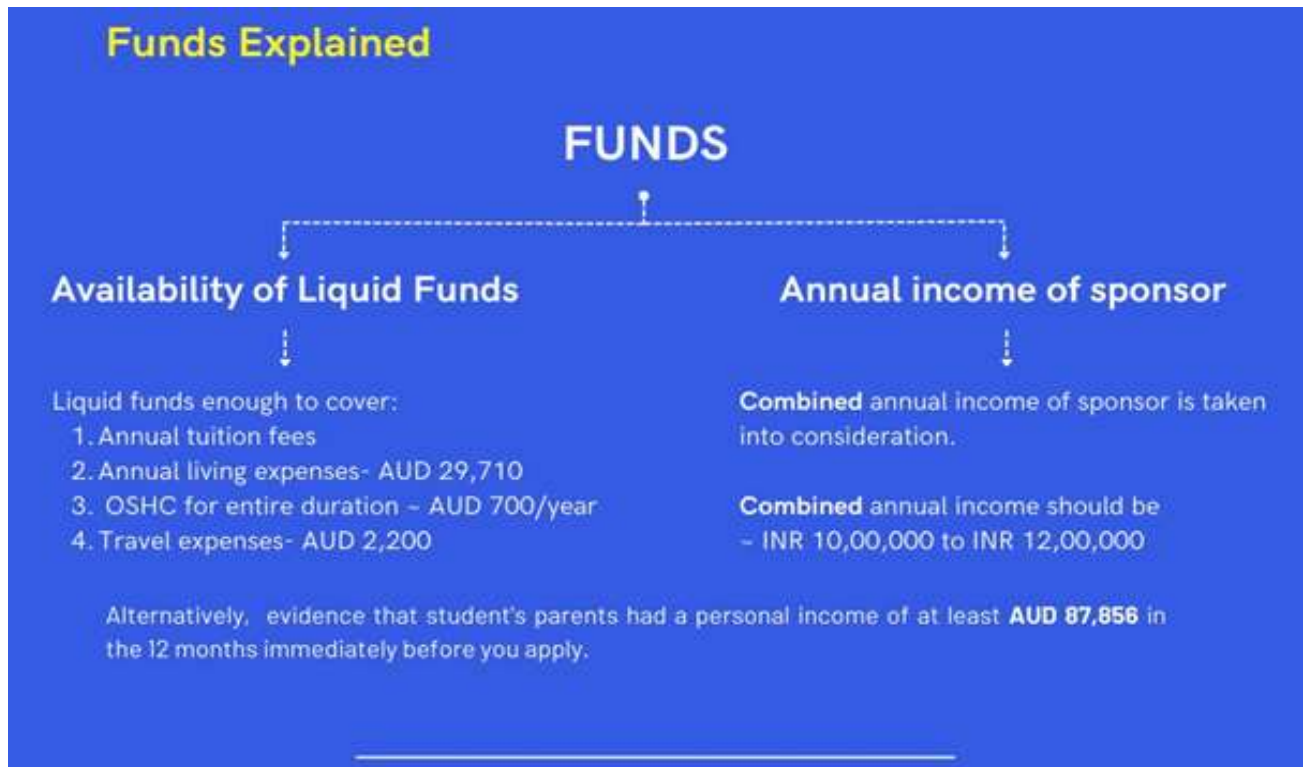
In the online student visa application form, applicants will be asked the below questions to address the GS criteria:

- I. Details of the applicant's current circumstances:
- II. Why study this course with this particular education provider:
- III. How completing the course will be of benefit to the applicant:
- IV. Details of any other relevant information the applicant would like to include.

**Answers must be written in English, with a maximum of 150 words per question.**

Along with the responses included in the application form, the applicant **must attach supporting documents** with the application. **Generic statements unsupported by evidence are not given significant weightage.**





**\*Maintenance of funds for 3 months might differ from university to university**

Who can sponsor the student?

Blood relatives:

- ✓ Parents and Siblings
- ✓ Grandparents (Maternal and Paternal)
- ✓ Maternal Uncle, Maternal Aunt
- ✓ Paternal Uncle, Paternal Aunt

If any of the relatives is providing the funds, following is needed:

- evidence of relationship with them
- their identity documents

Note:

- It is suggested that the quantum of sponsorship from any relative, apart from Parents/Siblings, should be restricted to 30%.

What type of funds are accepted?

- ✓ Savings
- ✓ FD's
- ✓ Education Loan (Need not be 3 months old)
- ✓ PPF (no other PF is accepted)

What type of banks are accepted?

- ✓ Nationalized banks
- ✓ Private sector banks
- ✓ International banks

Note:

- If the financial support provided involves a business, show the proof the business is operating.
- If student is providing evidence of deposits of money, explain their source.



Any education loan to cover tuition or living costs should be paid out according to the agreement between the student, the bank and the education provider. If the student receives any payments before DHA makes a decision on the application, provide the evidence including the terms of the loan and the full amount you will be paid.

If student is relying on another kind of loan, provide:

- evidence of the security used.
- the terms of the loan
- evidence that students can cover ongoing costs.
- The best evidence you can provide of genuine access to funds if a student is relying on a loan is evidence of disbursement.

### Requirements for the student visa (Subclass 500)

#### **Basic Checks, one must:**

- Be enrolled in a course of study in Australia.
- Hold Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)
- Prove he/she has a welfare arrangement, if under 18

#### **With this visa, one can:**

- Stay up to 5 years and in line with your enrolment.
- Participate in an eligible course of study in Australia.
- Travel in and out of Australia
- Work up to 48 hours a fortnight when your course of study or training is in session

### Documents required:

In the process of applying for an Australian student visa for your studies in Australia, you will typically require:

- Identity documents (valid passport)
  - a national identity card, if you have one.
  - proof of change of name.
- Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE).
- Evidence of financial ability (tuition fees, living and travel expenses)
- Genuine Student Requirement.
- Academic and work experience documents.
- Evidence of your English Language proficiency.
- Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC).
